Impact of various phases of lockdown policies on patient outcome

-INTRODUCTION-

During COVID19, elective surgery and outpatient clinics were suspended indefinitely to reallocate in-hospital resources, expand the number of ICU beds, and reduce personal protective equipment consumption. Further, restrictions of the patient's mobility among other factors impacted patient behaviour. Thus, there was a delay in definitive care due to non-availability and non accessibility of primary contact medical facility (specialist services). The dynamic changes in policies during the pandemic required flexible approach by the medical community towards patient care. There was tendency towards treating acute conditions conservatively (Eg - Acute appendicitis, Acute Cholecystitis, Diabetic foot). The lockdown policies imposed to contain the spread COVID19 had negative impact in delivering optimal surgical care.

AIM-

To assess the impact of policies implemented during various phases during lockdown in the management of Emergency surgical cases on patient outcomes

METHODS-

Ambispective study was conducted by collecting details from emergency surgical patient records during lockdown periods and compared to the same in the same period of time prior to lockdown. During lockdown, 110 patients required emergency surgerical care whereas prior to lockdown in the same period in 2019, 249 patients required emergency surgical care. The data collected was objectively analysed using POSSUM(Physiological and Operative Severity Score for the Enumeration of Mortality and morbidity) score and Clavien Dindo score. The same was compared during lockdown(2020, 2021) and prior to lockdown(in 2019).

RESULTS-

Mean Physiological score and Mean Operative severity Score for patients requiring emergency surgical care in lock down was significantly higher (p<0.001)



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compared to patients requiring emergency surgical care prior to lockdown. This was extrapolated to calculate the mean morbidity and mortality which was also significantly higher in the lockdown period compared to the same prior to lockdown. Post operative complications were assessed by Clavien Dindo score which was found to be similar in the 2 periods indicating patients received optimal treatment in hospital.

CONCLUSION-

We can thus conclude that the lockdown period had significant negative impact on morbidity and mortality in patients requiring emergency surgical care.

Effect of Chewing gum on reducing post operative ileus after intra Abdominal surgeries. a randamized clinical study

INTRODUCTION -

Ileus is a major cause of morbidity in hospitalized patients. A degree of ileus is a normal physiological response to intra-abdominal surgery, which often resolves quickly. Exposure of peritoneal cavity to outside and bowel manipulation provokes various systemic and local inflammatory response leading to paralytic ileus. Sham feeding is a procedure where food and drink are not actually digested, but a regional cephalic-vagal response is activated, promoting an increase in plasma gastrin levels, substance P and pancreatic polypeptide. Gum chewing has shown the same response of activating regional Cephalo-vagal response

OBJECTIVES -

To determine the effects of Chewing gum for the reduction of post-operative ileus after surgery for Intra-abdominal pathology

METHOD -

A randomized clinical study done including 40 patients undergoing intra-abdominal surgery for various intra-abdominal pathology at Ramaiah medical college hospital from December 2020 to September 2021. post operatively patient divided into two groups. Group A (gum chewing group) allowed to chew the gum for 4 times a day for 15 min each time. Group B (control group) standard post operative care is given without gum chewing. both group patients were assessed for presence of paralytic ileus.

RESULTS -

Post operative ileus is seen in 4% (1 patient) among Group A compared to 20% (4 patients) among Group B with a significant p value (0.006). passage of flatus with in first 48hours observed in 95 % (19 patients) among Group A compared to 60 % (12patients) among Group B with significant p value (0.002). Decrease in incidence of post operative nausea and vomiting is observed among Group A compared to Group B.





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CONCLUSION -

Use of chewing gum is associated with less incidence of post operative ileus, decreased incidence of post operative nausea and vomiting with early passage of flatus. since gum chewing is inexpensive, easily available and with less morbidity can be used safely among patients undergoing intra-abdominal surgery.

A Rare Case of Focal Nodular Hyperplasia (FNH)

Introduction:-

FNH is an unusual benign condition of unknown aetiology. There is a focal overgrowth of functioning liver tissue supported by fibrous stroma. Patients are usually middle aged females, and there is no association with underlying liver disease.

Case history:-

A 33 year female presented with the complaints of mass in the right upper abdomen since 1 year. Associated with pain which was on and off. No H/o Use of Oral contraceptive. K/C/O Autoimmune thyroiditis during pregnancy. Patient underwent annual health check up.In which USG abdomen showed, well defined oval isoechoic solid lesion of 75x58 mm in right lobe of liver with no calcification or cavitation.

On examination patient is moderately built and well nourished. Heart rate of 90 bpm, Blood pressure 110/70 mmHg, SpO2- 99% on room air,Respiratory rate 20 cycles per minute. Systemic examination, inspection no abnormality on palpation 6x5cm mass noted in right hypochondrium region in the midclavicular line 3 cm below costal margin. borders well made out, smooth surface. moves well with respiration on percussion Dull note over the mass continues with liver dullness. CT abdomen revealed exophytic mass of 71x73x95 mm arising from the inferior right lobe of liver with prominent arterial recruitment and central scarring. AFP, CEA, HCV AND HbsAg were negative. Patient underwent laparotomy with cholecystectomy and wide resection of segment V and VI of liver. Intraoperatively 10x8 cm vascular fibrous exophytic growth arising from segment v and vi of liver adherent to gallbladder, dilated lymphatics noted around gall bladder and remaining liver parenchyma appeared grossly normal. Histopathological report was suggestive of focal nodular hyperplasia of liver.





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Discussion:-

Pre-operatively FNH is difficult to diagnose. If patient present with huge lesion and with symptoms surgical resection of the liver with adequate margin is the treatment of choice. FNH do not have malignant potential.




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This transformed my career and helped me to plan my future with confidence.

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
